PAC-12 TEAMS TAKE AIM AT NCAA TITLES First NCAA titles of the academic year up for grabs

A combined nine Pac-12 teams are headed to Louisville, Ky., for the 2012 NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships on Saturday, Nov. 17. It is the first national championship of the fall season up for grabs. And with the Conference leading the country in all-time team national titles, NCAA Championships has been where Pac-12 teams have risen to the top.

On the men's side, four teams will be representing the Conference, as well as four individuals. STANFORD qualified to compete at the championship after winning the NCAA West Regional last weekend. The Cardinal is under the direction of first-year head coach Chris Miltenberg who made his way to Palo Alto after leading his Georgetown women's squad to its first-ever NCAA title in 2011. Miltenberg will be hoping for his personal repeat with either/or the men's or women's squad from Stanford.

UCLA and OREGON earned at-large bids after finishing third and fourth, respectively, at the regional meet. COLORADO is the fourth representative from the Conference heading to Louisville. Under the direction of head coach Mark Wetmore, the Buffs are making their 42nd NCAA Championships appearance. CU won its second-straight Pac-12 title and placed third at the NCAA Mountain Regional to earn an at-large bid.

All four of the men's teams headed to the NCAA Championships are ranked in the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) top-30. Both the Cardinal and Buffs have been in the top 10 all season. Stanford leads all Conferences teams as it is ranked No. 2 in the poll. Colorado is No. 7, Oregon is No. 16 and UCLA is No. 22.

Individually, the Conference is sending a contingent of four men's runners who can only challenge for the individual crown. ARIZONA's Lawi Lalang has been unbeatable, literally, the last two seasons. He is the defending national champion after winning the race last year by 13 seconds over the second-place runner. Lalang is coming off a win at the Pac-12 Championships and the NCAA West Regional. On his heels is teammate Stephen Sambu, who did not compete in cross country last year. Back this season, he has finished just behind his fellow Wildcat at the Conference and regional meets, nearly defeating Lalang at the Pac-12 Championships. The Wildcat duo will be joined by WASHINGTON's Joey Bywater and WASHINGTON STATE's Todd Wakefield in Louisville. Both also earned individual at-large bids after solid performances at the regional meet.

The women's Pac-12 contingent of teams is strong, and any one of the five could claim the NCAA title. ARIZONA, COLORADO, OREGON, STANFORD and WASHINGTON will all represent the Conference in Louisville. Four of those teams are ranked in the top seven in the USTFCCCA Coaches poll and all five are in the top 25. The Ducks are the highest-rated Pac-12 women's team, entering the national championship with the No. 2 ranking. The Cardinal are not

far behind, ranking fourth and the Wildcats are fifth. The Huskies are seventh and the Buffs are No. 23.

OREGON seems to be running strong, coming off back-to-back wins at the Pac-12 Championships and the NCAA West Regional. Both titles were the team's first since 1995. The Ducks are led by senior Jordan Hasay, who was named the USTFCCCA West Region Female Athlete of the Year for the third-consecutive year after winning the third-straight West region title. Oregon seems to have put together one of its strongest teams in recent history and is looking to end its national championship drought, which dates back to 1987.

Led by senior Kathy Kroeger, the Cardinal were second at the West region meet, automatically qualifying for the national meet. Kroeger has challenged Hasay every season, finishing in the top three of the Pac-12 Championships in each of the last two season before finally breaking through to win the individual crown three weeks ago in Santa Clarita, Calif. Meanwhile, Arizona has been on the rise the last few years and is relying on a contingent of veteran runners to Louisville.

Washington has been a solid team all season. Last year, the Huskies placed second behing the national champion by just eight points. It was the closest margin of victory at the race since 1998.

Colorado was third at the Mountain Regional meet, led by senior Shalaya Kipp. She was second at the regional meet but is coming off a career season where she qualified for Team USA at the 2012 London Olympics in the steeple-chase.

Individually, UTAH's Amanda Mergaert makes her third-straight appearance at the NCAA Championships as an individual after placing in the top 25 at the Mountain regional. CALIFORNIA sophomore Kelsey Santisteban makes her second-career appearance at the national championship meet.

In order to be eligible to participate in the championships, teams and individuals qualified in their respective regional competitions. Thirty-one teams were selected to participate in each championship. The top two, seven-person teams automatically qualified from each of the nine regions, for a total of 18 teams. Thirteen additional teams were selected at-large. Thirty-eight individuals were also selected to participate in each championship through an automatic qualifier and at-large selection process. All individual qualifiers finished in the top 25 in their region.

Pac-12 teams appear to be coming on strong as the season concludes on Saturday, Nov. 17. With so much talent on the men's and women's side, this could be the year the Pac-12 stands atop the podium for the first time since 2008.

POLL NOTES ... Four men's teams and five women's Pac-12 teams are ranked in the latest United State Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association's Coaches (USTFCCCA) poll. On the men's side, Stanford is tied for second in the nation with one first-place vote, while Pac-12 Champion Colorado had garnered two first-place votes and ranks seventh overall. Both have been ranked in the top 10 in the country all season. Oregon is 16th heading into the NCAA Championships, and UCLA moved up five spots to 22nd after a solid result at the NCAA West Regional.

On the women's side, four Pac-12 teams are ranked in the top seven in the nation. Pac-12 Champion and NCAA West Region Champion Oregon leads league teams ranking No. 2, inching up a spot from the previous poll. Led by Pac-12 Champion Kathy Kroeger, Stanford is ranked fourth and Arizona is fifth. 2011 NCAA Runner-up Washington ranks seventh in the country heading into the final meet of the season. Colorado rounds out the Pac-12 teams in the women's poll, ranking 23rd.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS RESULTS ... Following the meet, final results for the men's and women's races will be posted on the NCAA website at www.ncaa.com.

WHERE CAN I WATCH? ... A live webcast of the NCAA Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships will be broadcast beginning at noon ET/9 a.m. PT on NCAA.com on Saturday, Nov. 17. Links will be available on the home page and on the cross country page.

NCAA REGION RESULTS ... The Stanford men's teams and Oregon women's team captured the NCAA West Region titles. It was the Ducks' first regional title since 1995. Additionally, Oregon's Jordan Hasay was the individual winner of the race for the third-straight year. The individual men's winner was Arizona's Lawi Lalang. He claimed the title for the second-straight year.

USTFCCCA REGION HONORS ... Arizona's Lawi Lalang and Oregon's Jordan Hasay were named the UST-FCCCA West Region Male and Female Athletes of the Year. Both are repeat honorees, with Hasay earning the honor for the third-consecutive year. Additionally, Oregon head coach Robert Johnson was named the USTFCCCA West Region Women's Coach of the Year, the first time he has earned the honor.

ALL-REGION TEAMS ANNOUNCED ... The Pac-12 had 22 male runners named to the USTFCCCA all-region squad, while 23 women from league teams also earned spots on the team. The Conference led the nation with the most women's selections and tied for the second-most men's honorees. For a full list of names, visit pac-12.com or ustfccca.org.

PAC-12 SCHOLAR-ATHLETES OF THE YEAR ... Oregon's Jordan Hasay and Arizona State's Nick Happe were named the Pac-12 Scholar-Athletes of the Year. The award, which is presented in each of the 22 sports the Conference sponsors, was established to honor collegiate student-athletes that are standouts both academically and in their sports discipline. Hasay is a business administration major and boasts a 3.98 grade point average, whie Happe has a 4.09 gpa in finance. In order to be eligible for the Pac-12 Scholar-Athlete of the Year award, student-athletes must be a senior (in athletics eligibility) on track to receive a degree, have a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher, participate in at least 50 percent of the scheduled contests in the sport and have a minimum one year in residence at the institution. Each Pac-12 institution may nominate one individual per sport, and the winners are selected by a committee of Pac-12 staff members at the conclusion of each sport's regular season. The athletics accomplishments of the nominees are a consideration in voting for the award.

2012 CHAMPIONSHIPS REVIEW

SANTA CLARITA, Calif. - On a windy day in Southern California, the OREGON women won the Pac-12 Cross Country Championships at the Robinson Ranch Golf Course on Saturday morning. Following the Ducks' win, the COLORADO men captured its seconds-straight cross country crown. Individually, ARIZONA's Lawi Lalang won his second-straight league title, while STANFORD's Kathy Kroeger won the women's crown.

Tape-delayed coverage of the Pac-12 Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships will air on the Pac-12 Networks beginning Nov. 5 at 6 p.m. PT. Re-airs are scheduled for Nov. 6, Nov. 7 and Nov. 8.

The women's race was close from start to finish. The top-five runners crossed the finish line within 10 seconds of each other with STANFORD's Kathy Kroeger taking top honors for the first time in her career, running in a time of 20:06. Kroeger had finished second in 2010 and 2011.

In the women's team race, the Ducks claim their first team title since 1995. All-American senior Jordan Hasay was the team's top finisher, coming in second place just four seconds behind the winner. Hasay was the 2010 league individual champion. Oregon scored 47 points on the strength of three top-five finishers.

ARIZONA scored 69 points to finish third. Elvin Kibet and Jennifer Bergman placed third and seventh, respectively, to lead the team. STANFORD was third, tallying 82 points. In addition to Kroeger, Aisling Cuffe placed 10th to help the Cardinal.

WASHINGTON scored 92 points to place fourth in the team standings, followed by COLORADO (124) in fifth and UCLA in sixth (172). UTAH scored an even 200 points for seventh place, improving one spot from last year when the Utes competed in their first Pac-12 Championship. CALIFORNIA was eighth with

209 points, edging ARIZONA STATE, who scored 210 points for ninth place. USC placed 10th with 295 points, OREGON STATE was 11th with 305 points, and WASHINGTON STATE rounded out the field with 308 points.

Other notable individual finishers were UTAH's Amanda Mergaert, who cross the finish line in sixth place, while ASU's Shelby Houlihan, last year's Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year, was eighth among all placers. Cal sophomore Kelsey Santisteban came in ninth place.

In the men's individual race, ARIZONA's Lawi Lalang and teammate Stephen Sambu led the field the entire race. Both were neck-and-neck until the final straightaway, when Lalang was able to edge out Sambu in the final strides to cross the finish line first with a time of 22:49, just one second faster than his fellow countryman from Kenya.

COLORADO scored 49 points, 33 points more than second-place STANFORD, who tallied 82 points for second place. It was the largest margin of victory since the Cardinal defeated OREGON, 91-23, in 2003. The Buffs had runners finish seventh, eighth and ninth, and the top-five all finished in the top 15 overall. Blake Theroux led the Colorado pack, placing seventh.

STANFORD collected 82 points for third place, with Joe Rosa and Benjamin Johnson both crossing the finish line in the top 10 in sixth and 10th overall. OREGON's Trevor Dunbar and Parker Stinson battled for second and third place throughout the 8k race, helping the Ducks place third overall with 105 points, just four points ahead of fifth-place finisher ARIZONA STATE. UCLA scored 113 points for fifth place.

WASHINGTON's 119 points were good for sixth place, followed by seventh-place ARIZONA (166). WASHINGTON STATE placed eighth with 200 points, and CALIFORNIA's 239 points rounded out the field

Also finishing in the top 10 of the field was UCLA sophomore Lane Werley, who's time of 23:33 was good for fifth place overall among the individual men's finishers.

Entering the meet, four of the top six women's teams ranked in the latest USTFCCCA Coaches Poll were Pac-12 teams, including No. 3 Oregon, No. 4 Stanford, No. 5 Arizona and No. 6 Washington. On the men's side, Colorado was ranked No. 2 in the country, Stanford was third, Oregon was eighth and UCLA was 15th.
